

Wildlife Rehabilitation Center Naming Opportunities



About the Wildlife Rehabilitation Center

The WHS Wildlife Rehabilitation Center is the largest and most active wildlife hospital in the state, and one of the largest of its kind in the nation. In 2011, nearly 5,000 animals were treated in the Wildlife Rehabilitation Center. The patients represented over 140 different species, some of whom were endangered or threatened. The goal of the center is to rescue, rehabilitate and release injured wild animals back into the wild. In addition to rehabilitating and releasing wild animals, the center teaches adults and children how to live harmoniously with wildlife in their own backyard.

Public Areas of the Wildlife Rehabilitation Center

Wildlife Rehabilitation Center \$1,000,000

The WRC is a nationally recognized rehabilitation center, serving 5,000 injured, orphaned or sick wild animals every year. The center will be permanently named after you in all materials and signage.

Baby Nursery \$50,000

This area provides WHS staff space dedicated to the special needs of baby wild animals.

Wild Bird Display \$20,000

Showcased in the Wildlife Gallery, this is an original commissioned painting of a rehabilitated Blue Jay being released.

Wildlife Baby Panel \$5,000

The wildlife baby panel outside the baby nursery has a cute educational message about leaving wild babies alone, unless they are truly orphaned.

Outdoor Wildlife Enclosure \$500,000

This outdoor compound has been carefully designed to meet the unique needs of a wide variety of wild animals as they are being prepared for release in an outdoor environment.

Treatment and Exam Area \$100,000

WHS rehabilitation staff examines all incoming wildlife for disease and injury in the Treatment and Exam Area before locating the animals to their temporary rehabilitation quarters.

Intensive Care Unit \$25,000

Critically ill or injured wildlife are placed in the ICU for fluid therapy and close observation until their condition is stabilized for them to be transferred into the treatment areas.

Duckling Room \$20,000

The WHS Wildlife Department receives hundreds of orphaned baby ducks every year. The Duckling Room houses specialized cages needed to raise these babies.

Loon Laundry Room \$5,000

The Wildlife Department goes through so much laundry! This area ensures that clean linens are available at all times. This means a sanitary environment for wild animals in WHS' care.

Individual Nursery and Baby Raccoon Room Cages \$1,000 (25 available)

While animals are recovering, they need a private, quiet area so that they will not become too accustomed to being in the company of humans.
