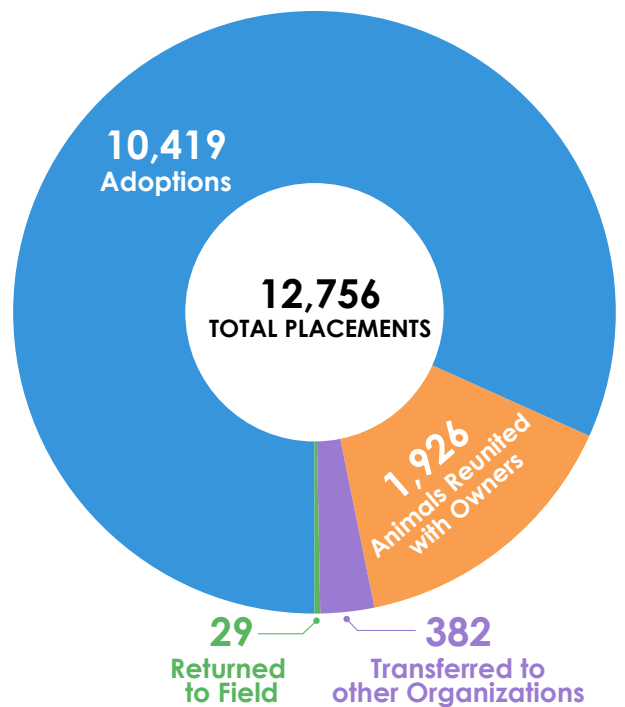
The Wisconsin Humane Society's mission is to make a difference for animals and the people who love them.

The Wisconsin Humane Society operates five shelters in Milwaukee, Saukville, Racine, Green Bay, and Sturgeon Bay, as well as a public Spay/Neuter Clinic in West Allis and a Wildlife Rehabilitation Center in Milwaukee. There is no national umbrella group in animal welfare; we are not a part of HSUS, ASPCA, or PETA. We don't receive any general government funding, and we are an independent nonprofit working locally in the communities we serve.
